MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Jack Edwards called the meeting to order @ 6:33 pm.

PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

Mayor Pro Tem Ed Samaha led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

MOMENT OF SILENCE

Mayor Jack Edwards asked for a moment of silence for our first responders, fireman, police officers and our military.

ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Mayor Edwards wanted to add one item under New Business, the expansion of the property and evidence room at the Police Department. Council Member Amelia Stinson-Wesley made a motion to add this item to the agenda with a second made by Council Member Chris McDonough. It will be number 7 under New Business. All ayes. (*Approved 4-0*).

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The Minutes of the Town Council Meeting on October 11th, 2022, the Work Session on October 24th, 2022, were submitted for approval. Mayor Pro Tem moved to approve the minutes with a second made by Council Member McDonough. All Ayes. (*Approved 4-0*)

CONSENT AGENDA

Tax Refunds are the only thing under the Consent Agenda and the tax refunds. Council Member McDonough moved to approve the Consent Agenda as presented with a second made by Council Member Stinson-Wesley. (*Approved 4–0*)

BOARD UPDATES and PUBLIC COMMENT

<u>John Holibinko, Pineville Chamber of Commerce</u>. The Chamber is holding an event at the Polk Presidential Estate on November 19th. A Christmas card has a 1940 International D2 pickup truck with the background of the Polk museum. They will be taking family pictures with all of the profits going to Pineville Neighbor's Place. Mr. Holibinko displayed sample photos and a list of prices: 25 cards for \$50; 50 cards for \$95; 100 cards for \$175; or an electronic image with unlimited publishing for \$50. Pineville Neighbor's Place is a great cause.

<u>David Phillips</u>, <u>Pineville resident</u>. Mr. Phillips read a statement (attached to these minutes) to Council from him and many other Pineville residents, regarding Cone Mill village and requested that no further development or construction in this area. The current infrastructure in the surrounding neighborhoods, as well as the primary arteries throughout the Town of Pineville, will not handle the influx of additional traffic and vehicles which is estimated conservatively at approximately 1,200 to 1,400 vehicles. It is already difficult, if not impossible, to exit these areas at certain times of the day or night now. Any future development of the vacant Mill property that would include any apartments or multi-family townhomes would completely destroy the character, charm and peacefulness, as well as the historic designation associated with this quaint Mill Village area. They urge each and every council member to remember this area is still a very vital part of Pineville and they all expect their support when the time for development decisions arrive by allowing single-family homes only on and around the vacant mill property and in our mill village neighborhoods.

<u>Al Baskins, Pineville resident.</u> Mr. Baskins seconded what Mr. Phillips said. Pineville Pride is where all of this came from. He does not want apartments or multi-family homes here. Traffic will be backed up more than it is now. He suggested building a road that runs parallel to the new pathway to McCullough out to the stoplight so there is another exit. He doesn't feel that Pineville is prepared for that. He feels it will destroy their life, as they know it. Before they vote on this, please read these minutes every day.

<u>Jane Shutt, Pineville Neighbors Place</u>. The 6th Annual Potato Drop was a tremendous success with over 200 volunteers helping to bag 30,000 pounds of potatoes which were picked up by 25 food pantries, soup kitchens and community agencies. Carolina Place Mall and Pineville Police did a great job sponsoring Touch-a -Truck – almost \$1,000 in donations were given to PNP along with 2 large wagons of food for the pantry. The Town of Pineville is sponsoring their annual food drive for Pineville Neighbors. Bring your donations to the electric company, Town hall, Belle Johnston Center, or Carolina Scoops Ice Cream shop. Over 350 people picked up free over-the-counter medications at the event last week sponsored by MC MedAssist, Atrium Health and PNP. Donations are currently needed for the Shop with a Cop program. You can also shop their Amazon wish list, found on their website. All donations are needed by December 1st. Carolina Scoops is donating 10% of their proceeds in November to support the Shop with a Cop program, so you can help by eating ice cream! The week of November 14th, they will be distributing 200 Thanksgiving meals, donated by Elevation Church Blakeney. The Chamber is offering a great deal on Christmas cards. All proceeds from that event will go to PNP. Last, PNP is now accepting applications for the Pineville Neighbor's Place Board. If you know of someone who would like to be a part of this important work, please contact Ms. Shutt.

<u>Justin Musick, Citizens Advisory Board</u>. Mr. Musick gave an update on the Citizens Advisory Board by providing highlights of their recent meetings. The innovation piece of CATS, bus and rail system is building a new transit system. They are planning on moving that location to a new area and making it much grander. It will be located behind the arena. The bus stop is being built underground with office space and a hotel above it, as well as possibly the Charlotte Hornets practice facility. There are some ventilation challenges that go along with these changes. They are working through some designs to figure out the best way to handle that. Employee retention is another challenge. CATS is working very hard to try and retain its employees. They are also putting security on buses with certain routes, that have had security issues. A new app similar to Uber, is being planned, as to when you r bus will be there. These are the three big key things being discussed at the meetings. Mayor Edwards thanked Mr. Musick for the update.

OLD BUSINESS

<u>Fire Department Funding (Chief Gerin)</u> This discussion was being continued from the Work Session last month. Finance Director Chris Tucker reviewed the presentation, financial model, with Council that was reviewed at the Work Session.

Chief Gerin was asked by Mayor Pro Tem Ed Samaha to give justification for the new fire house. The fire house was bult in 1960 or 1970. Renovations were done in November of 2015 where office space and built some living quarters above. They want a fire department that the Town and Council can be proud of. Their vision is to have a fire house that meets the needs of

Pineville, South Charlotte, as it becomes more global, it will meet the needs for that. As of today, we've run 2,518 calls. Our final goal is to make this a fire house good for another 50 to 100 years. Council member McDonough asked about the wash bay. Chief Gerin replied that it will be a very usable bay and not built solely as a wash bay. There will be a fire truck in there each day. He added that there is very limited office space; sleeping quarters might be addressed and is a pretty big need.

Mayor Edwards asked if the \$13 to \$15 million cost includes any architectural or pre-construction costs. Town Manager Spitzer replied that it does not. Mayor Edwards continued that he wants visibility of what the total cost is because that money may be coming out of reserve funds. Mr. Spitzer gave options for the loan and said that if council gives them a ceiling, they will not go above that ceiling amount. If needed, they can begin cutting things down. He added that prices are also starting to trim down.

Chief Gerin added that currently they're operating as a combination fire department. However, in 20 years, there may be a full-time fire department with administrative assistants. Finance Director Tucker went over the excel spreadsheet he put together for Council and explained the general fund and what it entails.

He summarized that he is happy to report that we will be adding \$2.8 million to the general fund balance and revenues are good. The Town has significant fund balance available to them. He continued that he feels we will have a balanced budget this year and will continue to see growth in the tax base. He reminded Council that these are assumptions and that he's trying to mirror what we've done in the past.

Council Member Gladden feels that there are some residents who can't afford to have their tax rates go up right now. We have to look at this realistically. Mr. Tucker said that the model is sound. Sales tax in Mecklenburg County have been steady. Salaries and benefits are harder to predict. Council Member McDonough asked if there were any grants available to build new fire stations? Chief Gerin replied that they have applied for grants to get things for the fire station.

Council Member Gladden asked if we can continue this discussion at our next work session as we're at a stand-still. Mayor Edwards concurred and added that he would like to hear from Mecklenburg County. Town Manager Spitzer reminded Council that we're time-constrained and we've already signed documents for this and have to make a decision at some point. The model we have is starting design to meet the December 2025 deadline. Designs will take six to eight months, then the building will take several months. Mayor Edwards thanked everyone for their input.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Code of Ethics.</u> Town Manager Spitzer said that in 2009, the General Assembly had legislation that directed municipalities to adopt a Code of Ethics by 2011, however, the Town never did this. The draft sent to Council was modeled after the Town of Matthews, as they adopted it in 2011. It needs to be adopted, as a Resolution, that will carry on from year-to-year. Council Member McDonough moved to adopt the Code of Ethics with a second made by Council Member Stinson-Wesley. There were three ayes (McDonough, Samaha and Stinson-Wesley) and one no (Gladden). *Motion passed (3-1)*.

<u>Discharge of Firearms.</u> Town Manager Spitzer discussed three options for amending Section 130.03 of the Town Code. This section of the Code has to do with the discharge of weapons to include guns, bows and crossbows. It was decided by Council to only allow the discharge of weapons at approved facilities or property. There are two exceptions that were kept from the original code section: (1) allowing officers of the law to discharge weapons in the course of their duty, and (2) allow of discharge of weapons for the protection of home and property. Council Member Gladden wanted to confirm that black powder is covered under the firearm. He replied yes. Mayor Pro Tem Samaha moved, and Council Member Stinson-Wesley seconded, to accept the ordinance for the Town of Pineville Amending Title XIII, General Offenses, at Section 130.03, Discharge of Firearms to Restrict Bow and Bow Type Weapons from being discharged. *Motion passed (4-0)*

Retrofitting of the property and evidence room. Chief Michael Hudgins advised Council that they are running out of space within their building, to store property and evidence. To alleviate this matter, they looked into installing rolling space-saving shelves, but the cost was \$70,000. As a secondary option, they looked at expanding the size of their property and evidence room. The cost of expansion will be \$23,151 and they request using asset forfeiture funds to do so. He feels this should hold them for several years to come. Town Manager Spitzer shared with Council that this money is above and beyond what they

put in the budget for this year. Mayor Pro Tem Samaha moved to move the asset forfeiture funds and to allow the police department to expand their property and evidence room with a second made by Council Member Stinson-Wesley. *Motion* passed (4-0)

<u>Manager's Report</u>. Mr. Spitzer reported that the Greenway is about finished in design. We will bid it out by December and hoping late Winter to early Spring to begin construction. This is the connection going out to McCullough and funded through ARPA funds.

A survey is out for Fall Fest. It's on our Town's Parks and Rec Facebook page through the week before Thanksgiving and we will put that information together and present to Council at the December meeting, or the prior work session.

ETJ. We did finalize the agreement with the County for \$812,000/year. Council agreed to \$809,000, but he got them up to \$812,000. We will be hiring officers to go into the Academy starting in January. They should be policing down there in July. We have a five-year contract to see how we like it.

Congratulations to our Electric Department, who helped save tree-trimmers in the city along with the Fire Department since the Fire Department ladders could not reach them. Also, congratulations to Officer Down who helped out a homeless man by getting him a haircut and some other items.

Town Clerk Lisa Snyder gave an update on the grand opening celebrations with the library. It is scheduled for Friday, December 9th, at 10:00 am. In the event of rain, the celebrations will be held in the community room on the first floor, starting with speakers at 10:00, followed by refreshments and tours of the library following. On Saturday, December 10th, the library will be doing some of their own grand opening events including a scavenger hunt. A soft opening may be held next week, but as of now, there is no set date.

Council Member McDonough asked for an update on the Johnston Road realignment. Planning and Zoning Director Travis Morgan replied that he is trying to get reimbursement for the construction/design portion. If we cannot get reimbursement, the Town will have to fund the entire amount. NC DOT endorsed the winning bid which is with Sealand.

Council Member Gladden asked for an update on Lowry Street. Public Works Director Chip Hill answered that we are having some problems with the storm drains but thinks we got it worked out. They want to complete it when school is not in session.

Mayor Edwards announced a five-minute recess before going into Closed Session pursuant to NCGS 143-318-11(3) – investigation of conduct.

Mayor Pro Tem Samaha moved to go into Closed Session with a second made by Council Member McDonough at 8:20 pm. All ayes.

ADJOURNMENT

Motion was made by Council Member Stinson-Wesley to adjourn followed by a second made by Mayor Pro Tem Samaha. (*Approved 4-0*) The meeting was adjourned at 8:50 pm.

SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 2022, AT 11:00 AM PINEVILLE TOWN HALL CONFERENCE ROOM

The Town Council of the Town of Pineville, NC, met in a Special Meeting on Friday, November 18, 2022 @ 11:00 am.

ELECTRICITIES 101

David Lucore, Electricities Systems Manager, gave a presentation entitled, "Electricities 101" to Council per their request. He began with a basic history and fundamentals of electricity. There are three types of electric utilities: 1. Public Power utilities; 2. Rural Electric utilities and 3. Investor-owned utilities. The Town of Pineville falls under the public power utilities umbrella, as it is governed by elected officials, the mayor, city council members and citizens. It is also community-owned and a not-for-profit company.

Rural Electric Cooperatives are governed by member-elected boards and are member-owned. Investor-owned utilities are for profit and shareholder-owned and governed by private boards.

Public power is a division of local government. While each public power utility is different, they all have one common purpose: providing customers with safe, reliable, not-for-profit electricity at a reasonable price while protecting the environment. In North Carolina, 73 municipalities own and operate an electric distribution system that benefits their communities. Pineville is an NCMPA1 participant.

There are five elements of public power business models: public ownership, local control, non-profit operations, low-cost structure, and customer focused. A "trademark" of public power is reliability. Industry data shows that Electricities communities provide more reliable power and restore power more quickly than investor-owned utilities.

Electricities was formed in 1968. It was incorporated in 1984. The Emergency Assistance Program also began and Electricities coordinates regional mutual aid. Electricities is governed by a 16-member board of directors. It has expanded to South Carolina and now provides training to that area.

In 2016, Electricities entered into an operating agreement with the Town of Pineville, serving as a managing agent for the operations of the Town's electric systems. Since that time, Electricities handles meter reading, construction and maintenance, connections, and disconnections for the Town. After an accident in 2016, it was determined that there was negligence on the practices that the Town was doing, and Haynes Brigman, the town manager at that time, decided that it could have went a much different direction and resulted in a death. The decision was made to have the linemen become Electricities employees instead of town employees.

Town Manager Spitzer told council members that they will find costs for this under Tammy's budget under the contract services section. He added that we also share David Lucore's salary with Huntersville and Cornelius. In two more years, the Town will negotiate another contract with Electricities.

North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC) has interconnections in the United States, with different regions, and are capable of transferring power between themselves. However, Texas has its own region and is isolated from the others. When three winter storms hit the state in February 2021, Texas had no interconnections to receive power from.

Mr. Lucore explained Generation, Transmission and Distribution of electricity in his power point presentation. Generation comes from power plants (coal, natural gas or nuclear stations); Transmission is what happens through the power lines, and Distribution is when the high voltage transmission is converted to a lower voltage at a substation. It was noted that Pineville is 98% carbon-free!

He also noted that industrial generates the most dollars, but we need a good mix of all: residential, commercial, industrial, lighting and others. The net income for a municipality is about 2%, but this varies from city to city.

Mr. Lucore discussed solar panels and said that we don't have the incentives to offer it to our customers at this time. People who have solar panels are not seeing a very big savings.

Council member Amelia Stinson-Wesley and Mayor Pro Tem Samaha expressed interest in touring the nuclear facility. Mr. Lucore replied that it takes approximately one month to get it set up and there is tight security.

The Special Meeting ended at 12:48pm.

Re: Rezoning 106 Franklin Street (Public Hearing/Action Item)

Background:

Property owner Darin Morton first inquired about straightening the property line between the two properties he owns at 618 Main and 106 Franklin. Both properties are zoned separately and adjusting property lines would impact zoning boundaries as well.

Request:

Property owner Darin Morton owns 618 Main Street and 106 Franklin. 618 is zoned RMX (residential mixed-use) and 106 is zoned R-12 single family residential. Mr. Morton wishes to rezone 106 Franklin to RMX so both properties are zoned the same.

Staff Comment:

Staff had requested a survey to confirm location property lines. Survey shows insufficient road right of way for both Franklin and Main Street. With both properties zoned the same the property owner can adjust the property lines as he would like through staff in the future. Staff can support the rezoning as consistent with the area, adopted Town plans, and his use of the existing RMX zoned 618 Main Street address; so long as the proper road right of way is established for existing and future sidewalks. Redevelopment of the properties would require compliance with any zoning ordinance buffers and/or conditional site specific plan that you as Town Council would review.


Existing Main Street property line goes into the vehicular lane. Mr. Morton proposes 16.7 feet dedicated Town right of way (9.6 feet from back of curb) along Main and 6 feet from back of curb along Franklin. Staff finds the proposal consistent with adopted plans.

Planning Board:

Planning Board voted to recommend the proposal with consideration from the public at the public hearing.

Procedure:

This is the Public Hearing for the above rezoning request. This is the opportunity to receive additional public input and questions or clarifications. After the close of the Public Hearing Council may vote on the proposal following standard legislative simple majority vote process. Council may vote to approve, disapprove, or to approved with modifications as mutually agreed upon with the applicant. For any vote: a brief note or acknowledgement of consistency or inconsistency statement is needed per ordinance and state statute.

----- FEMA FLOOD FRINGE LINE







The Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act (NC-GS 159) requires local governments to have their accounts audited by a CPA or CPA firm. The results of the audited accounts become the Town's financial statements, often called the audit report.

For Council's information at the December 8, 2022, Council Meeting, Ko Tang Cha-Moses with Martin Starnes and Associates will be in attendance to present the attached presentation which will present the results of her firm's audit of our financials.

Unfortunately, the State has not accepted our report yet, but we do not anticipate them having any major concerns or recommending any material changes. Due to this, we have not printed bound copies of the report. However, it is best practice to communicate the results of the fiscal year within six months of the close of the fiscal year, and I feel this presentation does that.

If you desire a watermarked draft of the financials, please reach out to me. Otherwise, I will distribute the final accepted version as soon as they are available.

As I conveyed in our recent workshop discussion, the General Fund had a very positive year. I am happy to report that the Electric Fund remains healthy. Also, I can report that the Telephone Funds remain consistent with their recent activity.

Our auditors have issued us an unmodified opinion, a desired outcome. They have issued us one finding, which while disappointing, I assure Council that in this case, sounds worse than actual and I am comfortable explaining the why and the how we avoid in the future. I have attached a memo to you explaining the finding from my perspective. I feel confident that Ms. Cha-Moses will support my position on the matter.

There is no action required other than to hear the information and pose any questions to myself or Ms. Cha-Moses.







RE: Council Information – Audit Finding

As I mentioned in my agenda item memo, the Town received one finding from the audit fieldwork. The finding is an internal control finding stating the Town overspent two appropriations. Both over-expenditures are related to the 911 Special Revenue Fund, known internally as Fund 20.

Fund 20 is a Special Revenue Fund meaning it has restricted revenues that must be used for restricted expenditures. In this case, State 911 funds are distributed and restricted for certain Telecommunication Operations. A benefit of Special Revenue Funds is that typically all resources in the fund are available for appropriation due to their restricted nature.

For the FY22 Budget, the 911 Fund was appropriated \$155,000 for expenditures. However, the fund had available to it an excess of \$400,000 in restricted fund balance. The fund spent \$177,000 resulting in over-expenditure of \$22,000, thus resulting in the finding.

The best way to avoid this over-expenditure moving forward would be to consistently bring forward the restricted fund balance for appropriations to allow the 911 operations to spend down this money. This is important, as having too much 911 funds in reserve results in not receiving future funds until it is spent down to an appropriate level.


Once it was determined that this finding was unavoidable, I took additional action to reconcile the fund to actual. What I mean by that is, the State was behind on approving the annual 911 PSAP report where they review how you spent your 911 funds. After I arrived, I was required to sign off on both the FY20 and FY21 reports after July 2022 before I could submit the FY22 report. The results of the State review had our fund and their records off by \$90,000.

The appropriate action was to transfer \$90,000 from the General Fund to the 911 Fund and bring the Special Revenue Fund to the State approved actuals. Since there was no budgeted appropriation for this, it results in a second over-expenditure but under the same finding.

Again, while disappointed in the finding, this reconciliation was necessary and probably avoided a prior period adjustment next year with an additional future finding.

Additionally, Chief Hudgins and his team are moving forward with discussions on how best to spend down these funds to advance the operations of Telecommunications, and I look forward to assisting him in presenting them effectively in our budget process.

Apologies for the accounting speak, but I do believe this is the most transparent way to communicate my perspective on this matter. Always available to discuss.





Re: Rezoning 106 Franklin Street (Public Hearing/Action Item)

Background:

Property owner Darin Morton first inquired about straightening the property line between the two properties he owns at 618 Main and 106 Franklin. Both properties are zoned separately and adjusting property lines would impact zoning boundaries as well.

Request:

Property owner Darin Morton owns 618 Main Street and 106 Franklin. 618 is zoned RMX (residential mixed-use) and 106 is zoned R-12 single family residential. Mr. Morton wishes to rezone 106 Franklin to RMX so both properties are zoned the same.

Staff Comment:

Staff had requested a survey to confirm location property lines. Survey shows insufficient road right of way for both Franklin and Main Street. With both properties zoned the same the property owner can adjust the property lines as he would like through staff in the future. Staff can support the rezoning as consistent with the area, adopted Town plans, and his use of the existing RMX zoned 618 Main Street address; so long as the proper road right of way is established for existing and future sidewalks. Redevelopment of the properties would require compliance with any zoning ordinance buffers and/or conditional site specific plan that you as Town Council would review.

Existing Main Street property line goes into the vehicular lane. Mr. Morton proposes 16.7 feet dedicated Town right of way (9.6 feet from back of curb) along Main and 6 feet from back of curb along Franklin. Staff finds the proposal consistent with adopted plans.

Planning Board:

Planning Board voted to recommend the proposal with consideration from the public at the public hearing.

Procedure:

This is the Public Hearing for the above rezoning request. This is the opportunity to receive additional public input and questions or clarifications. After the close of the Public Hearing Council may vote on the proposal following standard legislative simple majority vote process. Council may vote to approve, disapprove, or to approved with modifications as mutually agreed upon with the applicant. For any vote: a brief note or acknowledgement of consistency or inconsistency statement is needed per ordinance and state statute.

Comment Section from Question 8:

I missed the stage for the music. The makeshift stage just wasn't good. The space for the vendors and for the carnival rides seemed better Marked shuttle stops would have help











Re: Public Works Updates

Christmas Decorating: With a joint effort from Public Works and Electricites the Town was decorated within about one and a half weeks. (see picture #1)

Pothole Repairs: This month due to all the rain and cold weather, Public Works has used 3,000 lbs of cold patch. (see pictures #2 & 3)

HVAC RFP: STR Mechanical was awarded the contract and will continue the service of the Town's HVAC units for the next 3 years.

Dover/Cone Road Realignment: The Town's engineer mapped using GIS to identify the outer typo of the new road connecting Cone Avenue and Dover Street.

Cone Mill Memorial: There is currently a gas line on the property where the Memorial is proposed to be placed. PNG has agreed to move the gas line along the easement of the new road realignment section. (see engineering drawing labeled #4) This drawing shows where the current gas line is located in reference to the Memorial plan.

Right Turn Lane Lowery Street: The Town has signed the agreement necessary with NCDOT to do the traffic light study for the intersection. The plans for the project received from the engineer indicates that 4 easements are needed. Three temporary construction easements are needed along Lowery and one dedicated easement at the intersection of Lowery and S. Polk Street. LaBella is drafting the exhibits and will present them to the property owners when completed.

Stormwater Lynnwood/Lakeview: The project planning is currently on schedule. The Town is awaiting for the results from the appraiser for the pricing of the storm easement needed. Ryan will present the appraisal price to Council when received.

Item 11.

Huntley Glen: The Developer's engineer's plans on the revised ADA ramps have been reviewed and approved by Town staff, Mecklenburg County and the Town's engineers. There will be a preconstruction meeting on December 6th to establish completion of the repairs and final paving.

Elm Trees on Main Street: The elm trees that were removed for construction of the new Town Hall have been replaced.


Safety Highlights:
